Brow Well Service (Cont'd)



The Story of Auld Lang Syne: A New Book



"Auld Lang Syne" is recognized by millions of people who know nothing about Burns. M.J. Grant's book *Auld Lang Syne: A Song and Its Culture*, published just before the last Burns Night, covers all aspects of the song's history and impact, from the earlier songs by Aytoun and Ramsay, to the Burns version and variants, to the rituals and traditions that have grown up around it, and its popularization in New Year's programmes. 
The author, Morag Josephine Grant, began her musicological career at the University of Glasgow, where she studied music as part of a general arts degree. Her interest in twentieth century art music took her to London and thereafter Berlin, where she lived for almost twenty years before joining the University of Edinburgh in 2017 as a Teaching Fellow at the Reid School of Music.

A New Volume of Burns Supper Speeches

Those who know David Westwood's *Burns Supper Speeches: A Night in with a Dram and Friends* (2021) will be interested in his follow-up collection, *Burns Supper Speeches, Volume Two*, published on 20th June this year. Included are thirty-three varied speeches: twelve Immortal Memories, four toasts to the Lassies, eight replies to the Lassies, and nine other toasts, poems, and parodies, along with an introduction and conclusion.

Contributors include Thomas Keith, Ronnie O'Byrne, Moira Hansen, George McClelland (and Mrs McLelland) and other well-kent names. It is now available on Amazon at Paperback at $\pounds 11.42$ (ASIN number B0B4MBFRF5).


David is a past president of Airdrie Burns Club and has written several books on Burns in the *Robert Burns: A Night in with a Dram and Friends* series.

Burns Letters Belonging to RBWF



Two Manuscript Letters from Robert Burns to Maria Riddell were presented to the Burns Federation in 1993 and are held on deposit in the Mitchell Library, Glasgow, in their Special Collections department where they can be viewed by arrangement with the staff.


The first, dated November 1792 and addressed to Maria at Woodley Park, is 6 lines long thanking her for a copy of her book, *Voyages to the Leeward and Caribee Islands*. It consists of one page, previously folded, with the letter on one side and the address on the other.

The second, of December 1795 or January 1796, addressed to Halheaths, consists of

eleven lines of critique of some of Maria's poetry which she had previously given Burns. He is not overly critical except for one line for which he cannot suggest an improvement. Burns signs off in French "A Dieu je vous recommende!"

The first letter above is numbered "1" although we have two letters which editors have dated prior to this one. The next is the second last we have from Burns to Maria and is docketed "28" by Maria, of which 25 are published. If the numbering is by Maria, and the sequencing correct, there are other letters missing from this trail which have yet to be found.

Burns in Chinese



Another significant item in the ownership of Federation is a large artistic calligraphy wall hanging which has been hung in the headquarters Boardroom. It is by noted Chinese

calligrapher Huang Miaozi and is of *My Heart's in the Highlands*, three stanzas, lines 1-12, in Chinese script with a background of impressionist images of mountains, deer and highland scenes.

The omitted lines 13-16 are, of course, a repeat of lines 1-4; Burns declared the first stanza of this song to be old but claimed the other two as his. The song was particularly popular with overseas Burnsians as it conjured romantic images of Highland Scotland.

The calligraphy came to The Burns Federation many years ago along with a near life-sized portrait of a standing Burns as he could have been imagined in his Edinburgh days, clad in waistcoat and breeches in tail coat and hat with stylish boots. The portrait is embellished with a few lines from "The Tree of Liberty", a song for which attribution is contentious. This portrait is by Huang Yongyu, a well-known and multi-talented Chinese artist.

Both artworks are embellished with a variety of stamps in red ink which authenticate the works in lieu of signatures. [Bill Dawson Archivist]



Camperdown Burns Festival



The Camperdown Burns Festival gets underway with fundraising concerts in late June followed by a 3-day festival from $1-3^{rd}$ July.

As well as the usual feast of music there are also several interesting talks including 'A Ramble with the Campbells' tracing the history of the Campbells in the Western District. Another paper "Burns – Dealing with the De'il" examines the growth in illicit whisky distilling and smuggling in Scotland in the late 18th century and Burns's role in attempting to prevent it.

Burns was known for his rousing drinking poems such as 'John Barleycorn Must Die' and 'Scotch Drink', opposed new taxes on whisky and wrote a piece including the famous line 'Whisky and Freedom gang thegither.' How strange then, that Burns, who lambasted the excise officers in his song 'The Deil's Awa wi' the Exciseman' should be appointed to that role in 1789.

Courses at the Centre for Robert Burns Studies

Dig deeper into the life and works of Robert Burns, with a free online course entitled 'Robert Burns: Poems, Songs and Legacy' arranged by the University of Glasgow. This course from the Centre for Robert Burns Studies, will introduce you to the life, works and global celebrity of Robert Burns. You'll examine poems, songs, manuscripts, and objects used to commemorate the poet. You'll also develop your understanding of Robert



Burns's posthumous reputation - from Burns Suppers and Burns Night through to Hogmanay.

Some of the topics covered include: The cultural reputation of Burns as patriot, lover, and man of the people. Burns as poet and songwriter; major works such as 'Scots Wha Hae', 'Ae Fond Kiss', 'A Man's a Man', 'The Vision', and 'Auld Lang Syne;' the commemoration of Burns in material culture; and, the international celebrity and legacy of Burns.

No previous experience or qualifications are required for this course - just an interest in Robert Burns, Scottish history and culture, or poetry and song in general. It is ideal for anyone considering further study in the field, such the courses offered by the Centre for Robert Burns Studies at the University of Glasgow.

One of those courses is a ten-week course 'Robert Burns Online' which is taught over a 10-week period and starts in mid to late September. This online course offers a multi-disciplinary look at the life, work, and legacy of the 'Ayrshire Bard'. It aims to instruct students in key themes and areas for understanding the poet, including religion, politics, biography, and material culture. It also introduces students to key poems, songs, letters and prose writings by Burns. Applicants for this course must have completed the 'Robert Burns: Poems, Songs and Legacy course.

A range of full and part-funded bursary places is available via separate application directly to us. To be considered for a bursary, email your interest to arts-burnsonline@glasgow.ac.uk by 31 August, stating in 300 words or less why they would like to be considered for the bursary. Successful applications will be announced at least one week before the course starts.

Beethoven, Burns and George Thomson



The National Trust for Scotland (NTS) property Broughton House Kirkcudbright was the venue for a special evening of entertainment. In an exciting collaboration between the NTS and the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, a group of talented students and their artistic mentor Karen Cargill performed a compelling set of folksong arrangements, principally Scottish, all composed by Ludwig van Beethoven.

The story of a little-known national song project conceived in the 1790s by the Scottish music impresario and publisher George Thomson (1757-1851) was narrated by Edinburgh-based scholar and collector William Zachs. The 'unsung' hero George Thomson united the geniuses of the composer Ludwig van Beethoven (1770-1827) and the poet Robert Burns to produce the splendidly evocative songs rendered by the students and their mentor Karen.

As well as the Burns songs, the programme also included texts of other poets arranged by Beethoven, reflecting the scope and variety of Thomson's ambitious project. The evening was enhanced by a display of items from William Zachs' extensive collection including an original 24-page manuscript of five of the 180 arrangements Thomson commissioned from Beethoven. In addition, a select group of original Burns books, manuscripts and artefacts relating to the story of this collaborative project were available for viewing.

William Zachs, hailing from Hartford, Connecticut arrived in Edinburgh in 1983, intending to study at the University for one year. Nearly 40 years on, Bill is still in Scotland, working tirelessly to create a library and museum in a 17th -century Old Town building, now visited by hundreds of scholars, students, groups and friends. His current exhibition, Beethoven, Burns and the Folksong, tells the story at the heart of the evening's performance. All are welcome to visit the exhibition (by appointment). Burns is Indeed Back Here in Edinburgh

This is to advise you of a very rare Burns event, which I am sure will be of interest to you all. A new exhibition centre has opened within the National Library of Scotland on George IV Bridge, here in Edinburgh, which is called simply..."TREASURES"



As part of the first themed presentations on display is a section on Burns and, quite specifically, about Burns and Clarinda and for the very first time since 2009, is the letter he wrote to her in December 1791, in which he enclosed the words to "Ae Fond Kiss," along with two other songs (which have paled into insignificance besides our favourite love song.)

This very rare item in the possession of NLS, is only brought out for the public viewing, once in a blue moon. So, if you have the opperchancity (to quote Ricky Fulton), do go and see it.

The Treasures exhibition at the National Library highlights the origins of the famous love song 'Ae Fond Kiss, the words for which Robert Burns wrote in a letter to Agnes Maclehose in 1791. It also features one of many letters exchanged between Beethoven and Thomson, an Edinburgh-based publisher who asked him to write musical accompaniments for Scottish songs.


The new 'Treasures' gallery brings together, for the first time, rare books, maps, documents, photographs and films which have rarely been on public display before. It had been planned to open in the summer of 2020, but was delayed by the Covid pandemic.

Now open to the public, the exhibition features the letter from Burns to Clarinda mentioned above, a copy of the first edition of Charles Darwin's groundbreaking book *On the Origin of Species* together with a letter to his Scottish publisher, an account of the Battle of Culloden, and scraps of garments said to have been worn by Bonnie Prince Charlie and Flora MacDonald.

Some of the rarest books in the National Library's collections are going on permanent display for the first time, including one of 49 surviving copies of a Gutenberg Bible, the first book printed in Europe with moveable type in the 1440s. Some of the few surviving books created by Scotland's first publishers Walter Chepman and Androw Myllar, who set up a printing press in the Cowgate in Edinburgh in 1508, will also be shown.

Glasgow Haggis Club Anniversary Dinner

On Saturday 14th May the very spectacular 150th Anniversary Dinner of the Glasgow Haggis Club, was held in the sumptuous surroundings of Glasgow Art Club, where guests were served an excellent four course meal, before the formal proceedings began. As ever the Art Club had a wonderful exhibition hung on the walls and guests admired the work whilst enjoying the ambiance created by table settings complimented by beautiful flower arrangements of roses and thistles, prepared by Lynn Dalgleish.



A truly inspiring and insightful Immortal Memory was offered by Charles Edward, Lord Bruce, who took as his theme the connections of Robert Burns and Glasgow and expanded this into a consideration of the Scottish diaspora carrying the legacy to all parts of the world.

A fine, witty and memorable Toast to the Lasses was delivered by Bernard Ponsonby, who explored the historical landscape in which Burns lived before moving on to mention the themes and excellence of his many compositions, especially those on love. A wonderful reply from Professor Bashabi Fraser CBE, brought the international world of women into sharp focus, as she claimed the world might be better run by women, supported by men, quoting Mao Tse Tung, who stated, "Women hold up half the sky." Bashabi went on to give

examples of women leaders who have spoken out on environmental and political matters to great effect and challenged us all to work together.

The musical entertainment was led by Musical Director, Alan Craig, with his own special, newly-devised arrangements of Burns classics and sung superbly by Alan Beck and Aimee Toshney. There is no doubt that these arrangements ought to be professionally recorded and made available to a wider public. There was not a dry eye, when Aimee sang Handel's, aria from the Opera Rinaldo, Lascia Ch'io Pianga (Let me Weep) sung in notice of the Ukraine invasion.

A fund-raising effort at the event raised £900 (likely to be topped up to £1,000) which will be used for the Glasgow and District Burns Association, educational projects, which include the Aye Can! Summer School and educational packs for use by Burns enthusiasts.

The Long History of Burns in Japan

The recent recognition by the Scottish Samurai of the Federation's role in Scottish-Japanese relations reflects a long history. The Japanese professor Toshio Namba, an Honorary President of the Federation, about Burns in Japan, in Studies in Scottish Literature, https://scholarcommons.sc.edu/ssl/vol1/iss4/5/ The article gives these landmark events. Auld Lang Syne was first adapted in Japanese in 1881, for a high school graduation; in recent times the tune became so wellknown that it is used in supermarkets to signal that are about to close. The first Japanese article about Burns was in 1890, and The Cotter's Saturday Night was translated in 1908. The first volume of translations by Prof. Yoshiaburo Okakura was published in the Kenkyusha English Series in 1923, just 100 years ago next year. The first Japanese university thesis about Burns was submitted in 1934. No Japanese Burns club appears in the older club lists, but Clark McGinn notes that the first Burns suppers were probably held by St Andrews societies and Masonic groups, and the Glasgow Interactive map of Burns events records six Burns suppers in Japan in 2019-2020.

The Long History of Burns in Japan (Cont'd)



[Toshio Namba (1910-1989), Professor at Nihon University, Tokyo, who also wrote about Allan Ramsay and Thomas Carlyle, published several works about Burns, including translations, notably The Lyric Poetry of Burns (1960) and The Gem of Burns (1961), both giving parallel texts in Scots and Japanese, and The Poetry of Robert Burns (I think 1971). Jane Burgoyne, past president of RBWF, who met him when he visited Scotland in 1965, wrote a short article about him, "Our Man in Japan," in Burns Chronicle, 3rd series, 21 (1972), 49-51 (with a very formal photo of him facing p. 32): https://rbwf.org.uk/.../2016/05/1972-Burns-Chronicle.pdf. When he was made an honorary member of the Irvine Burns Club in 1977, he wrote back that it was "the proudest, happiest minute of my life," promising "I will not quit the pen on Burns as long as I breathe," and praying that his writings would influence the "younger generation in Japan even after my death."]

Order of the Scottish Samurai

At the 2022 Award Ceremony of the Order of the Scottish Samurai held on the 19th June, Marc Sherland was asked to present a short talk on the work of the Robert Burns World Federation, after which the Lord Lyon King of Arms, Joe Morrow presented him with a certificate of friendship and a beautiful samurai statuette, now on display in the Federation headquarters in John Dickie Street.

It was staged in the magnificent home of Charles Edward, Lord Bruce, in Broomhall, near Dunfermline, who gave a wonderful introduction to his family home and its art works. There were various awards made in different categories, and Marc was surprised when he was made a Great Shogun, by the founder of the Order, Ronnie Watt, OBE, who stated that the position was made in honour of Marc's outstanding achievements in services to world culture and to Scotland.

Just before lunch was served in the banqueting hall, Sensie Robert Boyd, gave a fascinating display of the martial art of Iaido, samurai sword art, and at one point the swishing of the blade came close to the nose of the Lord Lyon! The event brought together many people from various walks of life and under the watchful gaze of Consul General of Japan in Scotland, Tadashi Fujiwara, certificates, medals and medallions were awarded to people thought to be worthy.



Marc said of the occasion, "I felt most honoured and even more pleased that the Order presented a posthumous certificate to Robert Burns himself. Fiona Kennedy and Dr Irene Watt concluded the spectacular afternoon with the singing of Auld Lang Syne to the original tune.

South Ayrshire Self-Led Trail and Use of QR Codes (Cont'd)

One key aspect of the trail is the use of QR codes. A QR (Quick Response) code works similarly to barcodes at the supermarket. Each QR code consists black squares and dots which represent different pieces of information. When scanned, usually with a mobile device, the unique pattern on the barcode translates into human-readable data. In the case of Burns sites, this would offer the potential for detailed information being made available to enhance the understanding of a particular site. The Heritage Committee of the RBWF is currently investigating the possibility of introducing QR codes for items of interest related to Burns. 

A New Burns Book by Corey E. Andrews

Corey E. Andrews is well-known to many Burnsians for his articles, essays, and books about Burns, most notably *The Genius of Scotland* (2015). He has now followed them up with a new book, *Inventing Scotland's Bard: The British Reception of Robert Burns, 1786-1836*, number 6 in the South Carolina Scottish Literature Series. The book provides, year-by-year publication details and informative annotations on newspaper and periodical articles, biographical comment, and poetic responses to Burns and his work, from his first book *Poems, Chiefly in the Scottish Dialect* (1786) to the explosion of new biographical and editorial work in the 1830s. The materials reflect a wide spectrum of opinions and critical perspectives, from the contemporaries who encountered Burns on first publication, on to writers of the two succeeding generations. It makes a fascinating record of how in these crucial decades critics and



readers engaged with Burns's poetry to construct a national and international icon.
